# Introduction *Statement*



It aims to leverage the incredible assets within our community while maximizing opportunities for private and public investment, creating a dedicated revenue source, fostering philanthropy, and building an asset bank of both cash and in-kind contributions.

As we embark on this next decade of transformation, let us remain committed to improving outcomes for all of Overtown's children. Together, we can turn aspirations into actions, and dreams into reality, creating a community where every child has the opportunity to thrive.

# History of OCYC

In 2012, the Overtown Children and Youth Coalition (OCYC) was formed by the anchoring community based non-profit organizations in the Overtown Community: URGENT, Inc., Overtown Youth Center, Touching Miami with Love, Lotus House and Dress for Success with the support of the Southeast Overtown/Park West Community Redevelopment Agency and City of Miami District 5 City Commissioner Michelle Spence-Jones.

Establishing the OCYC was a groundbreaking step toward addressing the needs of Overtown's children in a more holistic manner, a focus designed to move away from the service-based structure that addressed needs in siloes and towards a collective impact and systems level approach.



With the creation of the first **OCYC Master Plan** spanning 2015-2025, the Coalition charged itself with three distinct responsibilities – each of which have been advanced over the past 10 years:

1

Create a shared vision for community wide action that promotes excellence, empowerment, economic growth and success for all Overtown children and youth and their families.

**COMPLETED:**

The 2015-2025 Master Plan outlined 5 Goals under a Collective Impact Framework.

2

Prepare an application to become the fourth Florida Children's Initiative (FCI)

**COMPLETED:**

During the 2017-2018 legislative session, OCYC secured official FCI designation for Miami-Overtown.

3

Develop a pipeline of integrated high-quality pathways for youth to succeed from birth through college.

**PROGRESS:**

For over 10 YEARS, OCYC has galvanized support for several partners serving youth 0-24 years old, leveraging current community assets and maximizing opportunities for private and public investment, the development of a dedicated source of revenue, philanthropy and building an asset bank of cash and in-kind contributions from a cross-sector group of partners who desire to improve outcomes for all of Overtown's children and families.



## About *Overtown*

Historic Overtown, one of Miami's oldest neighborhoods, was once a thriving center of Black culture and commerce, earning the nickname "The Harlem of the South" during the Harlem Renaissance, with famous performers like Louis Armstrong and Billie Holiday gracing its stages.

The community's vibrant cultural and economic life was severely impacted by urban renewal in the 1950s and 1960s, particularly the construction of I-95, which displaced over 12,000 Black residents, reduced the population by 80%, and led to economic decline and business closures.

Despite revitalization efforts in the 1980s and beyond, infrastructure improvements have also contributed to gentrification, pushing out long-time residents due to rising housing costs, even as transit development and the renovation of the historic Lyric Theatre brought renewed attention to the area.

Today, Overtown is undergoing a modern-day renaissance, with landmarks like the Black Police Precinct and Courthouse Museum, the Ward Rooming House, and the Black Archives at the restored Lyric Theatre paying homage to its rich Black heritage.

Culinary institutions such as Jackson Soul Food, operating since 1946, and Red Rooster by celebrity chef Marcus Samuelsson, have elevated Overtown's status as a destination for Southern cuisine, while the neighborhood remains home to historic churches, parks, and schools that serve the community's youth and future generations.

Through the work of the Overtown Children & Youth Coalition (OCYC), anchoring organizations, and community partners, OCYC strives to advance Overtown as a flourishing, enriched community where history is honored, and children and youth can thrive, ushering in the future generations of proud Towners.




A neighborhood of Miami, Florida, Overtown is positioned northwest of downtown Miami and occupies two square miles roughly bordered by Northwest 20<sup>th</sup> Street to the north, Northwest Fifth Street to the south, the Miami River and Dolphin Expressway (State Road 836) to the west and the Florida East Coast Railway and Northwest First Avenue to the east. 

### 1 EARLY DEVELOPMENT AND CARE OF CHILDREN

Providing resources to ensure that every child is adequately nurtured from birth to age 3. Ensuring that all schools are ready for children, and all children are ready for school by the time they reach kindergarten. Offering resources and educational support for families and child care providers.

### 2 EDUCATION OF CHILDREN AND YOUTH

Increasing the level and degree of knowledge and accountability of persons who are responsible for the development and well-being of all children in each of the Florida Children's Initiative designation. Creating a safe and respectful environment for student learning.

### 3 HEALTH AND WELLNESS

Eliminating health disparities between racial and cultural groups, including improving outcomes and increasing interventions. Providing fresh, good quality, affordable, and nutritious food within the communities of the Florida Children's Initiative. Providing all children within the Florida Children's Initiative designation with access to safe structured and unstructured recreation.

## The *OCYC Master Plan* goals and strategies are aligned with critical FCI Strategic Community Plan Focus Areas:

Increasing the high school graduation, post-secondary enrollment, and post-secondary completion rates among neighborhood youth. Increasing the leadership development and career opportunities for neighborhood youth.

Expanding access for parents to have opportunities to critical resources, such as career jobs, reliable transportation, high quality day care, and after-school care. # Goals & The *Master Plan* Pillars

The OCYC adopted the “Collective Impact” framework because implicit in this model, is the belief that all community stakeholders (individuals, organizations, and public institutions) share responsibility for the success of all of Overtown’s children. “Collective Impact” is a best practice framework that requires

the commitment of a group of actors from different sectors to champion a common agenda to solve a complex social problem. By defining a common agenda, establishing shared measurement protocols and building a system of mutually reinforcing youth programs and services community-wide.

The OCYC Master Plan is structured around 4 **GOALS** designed to meet our vision that all Overtown children, youth, and families will thrive. The Goals are as follows:



Every child will be **HEALTHY & SAFE**, physically, mentally, and emotionally in their homes, schools and community.



Every child will be **EDUCATED & ENGAGED** in academics, culture, and technology.



Every child will be prepared to be **PRODUCTIVE & WORKING** towards vocational, college, and career success.



Overtown’s systems and institutions will be **ACCOUNTABLE TO THE COMMUNITY** by being responsive, collaborative, and effective in efforts to empower children and youth to succeed.



# Cradle-to-Career Pathway

A cradle-to-career model is essential for guiding our work because it ensures that every child in Overtown receives continuous, coordinated support from the earliest stages of development through adulthood. By focusing on the entire educational and developmental spectrum—from prenatal care to post-secondary education and work force readiness—we address critical transitions and provide targeted resources at every life stage. This holistic approach not only

nurtures early childhood development but also supports academic success, skill-building, and career preparedness, creating a strong foundation for lifelong achievement and well-being. To ensure dedicated focus, each OCYC Committee will be primarily responsible for phases of the Cradle-to-Career Pathway, and will be supported by other committees' mutually reinforcing activities towards our overall common agenda.



# Implementation of the *Goals*

Achieving the vision and goals of the Overtown Children and Youth Coalition Master Plan requires strong commitment from elected officials, government, non-profits, philanthropy, the private sector, residents, and most importantly, youth.

The Goals will be accomplished through OCYC's Collective Impact approach, supported by a specific set of strategies for each goal.

Four targeted OCYC Committees and their cross-sector member partners will collaborate on an ongoing basis to:

- 1 Focus on existing and emerging areas of need,
- 2 Expand upon, prioritize, and implement action steps which leverage assets to address needs, and
- 3 Monitor progress and celebrate achievements around each of the goals' objective areas as measured by improvements in key community indicators.

The Accountability Committee will oversee progress on every strategy annually.

OCYC will continue to monitor and publish the Plan's implementation. Success depends on the coordinated leadership of service providers, policymakers, and community members, with full support from the Overtown community and Greater Miami-Dade.



# Goal #1 - Healthy & Safe

## Strategies

Provide support and resources for expecting mothers and families with young children, ensuring access to prenatal care, early childhood development programs, and family support services.

Support implementation of programs that address mental health, wellbeing, and support for children and youth, including trauma-informed care and counseling services.

Promote safety education initiatives for families, schools, and the wider community to prevent accidents, injuries, and unsafe behaviors in homes and public areas.

Increase access to physical activities, nutritious food programs, and health education to support health and wellness, and promote lifelong healthy habits for youth and families.

Enhance safety in the community by creating safe public spaces and supporting violence prevention programs, ensuring that families feel secure in their neighborhoods.

# Healthy & Safe Actions

## SUPPORT MATERNAL HEALTH AND EARLY CHILDHOOD

- Assess and enhance access to prenatal care
- Offer parenting workshops on maternal well-being, infant care, and early childhood development
- Support expansion of comprehensive maternal and child health services (prenatal care, pediatric services, and family support)

## MAINTAIN SOCIAL EMOTIONAL HEALTH AND WELL-BEING

- Implement school and community-based social-emotional learning programs
- Identify and support access to mental health resources
- Build upon availability and integration of mental health services such as therapy, support groups, and preventive programs

## IMPROVE SAFETY AND PREVENT INJURIES

- Develop community safety campaigns
- Distribute free or low-cost safety equipment (e.g., car seats, helmets) to families in need
- Establish a community safety task force that monitors long-term trends in injury and violence prevention

## PROMOTE ACTIVE AND HEALTHY LIVING

- Expand school-based physical activity initiatives and nutrition education programs
- Launch community exercise programs
- Create a Community Health Resource Guide
- Expand infrastructure for accessible recreational activities (i.e. pools, gyms, fields)
- Increase access to affordable healthy foods

## Strategies

Provide resources, mentorship, and college readiness programs to ensure that more youth successfully transition to higher education or vocational training programs.

Create career-readiness programs that connect youth to job training, internships, and employment opportunities, with a focus on equipping them with relevant skills for high-demand industries.

Develop youth leadership programs that foster civic engagement and advocacy skills, enabling youth to become proactive community leaders and change-makers.

Partner with local businesses and entrepreneurs to provide hands-on learning opportunities through apprenticeships, internships, and microbusiness development programs.

Form a Youth Advisory Council to represent the voices of young people in community decisions, ensuring that their perspectives are included in shaping policies and initiatives that impact their futures.

# Productive & Working Actions

- Create program where youth leaders collaborate with policymakers to address local issues through advocacy campaigns

- Support stipends for youth involved in internships, apprenticeships
- Support pitch competitions to provide seed funding for youth-led microbusiness ideas
- Partner with banks and investors to create a youth micro-loan fund for startups and small ventures

## ESTABLISH AND ENGAGE A YOUTH ADVISORY COUNCIL

- Recruit a diverse group of youth representatives
- Provide training on civic engagement and policy making processes
- Empower the council to co-design and implement youth-focused initiatives

## Strategies

Establish clear protocols for collecting and analyzing data while leveraging data-sharing platforms to ensure consistency, accuracy, accessibility, and collaboration across initiatives.

Create inclusive processes that engage partners and community members in shared decision-making to drive collective action to promote fair opportunities for all.

Develop robust evaluation frameworks and transparent reporting mechanisms to measure outcomes and communicate progress effectively.

Provide data-driven insights and resources to inform evidence-based program design, research priorities, and policy recommendations.

Guide efforts to secure sustainable resources and investments while building the capacity of coalition members, staff, and community leaders to drive change and ensure long-term leadership continuity.

# Community Accountability Actions

- Utilize centralized data collection tools to track progress across key indicators for all committees, ensuring accuracy and accessibility.
- Regularly assess program data and adjust strategies to ensure the coalition's efforts remain aligned with community needs and goals.
- Implement data-sharing that fosters collaboration and provides stakeholders with accessible, actionable insights to drive informed decision-making and collective impact.

## FACILITATE EQUITY, INCLUSION AND COLLABORATIVE DECISION-MAKING

- Actively engage marginalized groups, including youth and families, ensuring their perspectives, lived experiences, and cultural strengths shape the coalition's strategies and programs.
- Build capacity among partners to implement culturally competent and inclusive approaches, fostering environments where diversity is celebrated, and all community members feel valued.

## STRENGTHEN EVALUATION AND REPORTING

- Collaborate with data partners to analyze the outcomes of programs, policies, and initiatives, contributing to a robust evidence base.
- Produce coalition-wide reports to communicate progress to stakeholders, funders, and the broader community, highlighting improvements in health, education, economic opportunities, and community well-being.

## SUPPORT PROGRAM, RESEARCH, AND POLICY DEVELOPMENT

- Conduct regular reviews of current research and best practices to guide program development, ensuring initiatives are grounded in proven methods and tailored to meet the specific needs of Overtown's community.

## GUIDE SUSTAINABILITY AND CAPACITY-BUILDING EFFORTS

- Invest in the development of coalition members, staff, and community leaders to enhance the capacity to drive change and ensure continuity of leadership and expertise over time.
- Increase economic stability and opportunity by creating sustainable and diverse revenue streams and reinvesting profits back into the community, aiming to build long-term financial resilience for the community as a whole.
